Introduction

Portfolio Holder for Economy and Partnerships

As the Cabinet portfolio holder for Economy and Partnerships I am proud to say that the Area Action Partnerships fall within my remit.

AAPs have been supporting work in local communities for 15 years now. Funding has helped to sustain and develop numerous local organisations right across County Durham. Nearly £30m has been allocated through Area Budget grants since AAPs were created back in 2009 supporting nearly 3000 different applications.

The 14 AAPs cover the whole of the county, each with effective boards of 21 people which are made partners, public, councillors and agencies. The Boards work on their specific priorities that reflect the needs of the county's varied localities. Over the last year they have again allocated nearly £2M which has supported over 190 local projects.

Fellow County Councillors and I are very grateful for the support we get from the AAPs in allocating our Neighbourhood Budget. This is funding every councillor gets to support good causes and projects in the areas we represent. Since 2009 over £37m has been allocated through nearly 8000 different applications. You can imagine the difference funding via the AAPs and Councillors has made to our towns, villages and city. This year councillors have supported well over 600 projects with over £2.4M of funding.

At a time when communities and families are having to deal with ongoing financial pressures AAPs have been able to help those organisations who are helping others. The strength of the voluntary and community sector in County Durham never fails to amaze me.

I do want to take this opportunity to thank everyone who gives up their time and volunteers with local organisations. Be that with sports clubs, management committees at community centres, environmental schemes or those people who volunteer on AAP Boards. County Durham would be a poorer place without you. However volunteering has to be supported and it's a key area that AAPs help with in terms of supporting groups with volunteer management, training and support.

There is no doubt that community organisations are struggling through the ongoing cost of living crisis so if you have ever thought about volunteering now could be the time. Local organisations give so much to their communities and they do need our help.

Since 2009 AAPs have been a feature of our communities but change is ahead. Last year the council concluded a review of its community engagement activities which included the AAPs. The outcomes of this review are now being implemented and this is going to lead to enhancements in 2025 with AAPs being replaced by new 'Local Networks'. The Local Networks will continue to bring local people, councillors and organisations together building on the legacy of the AAPs with the aim of broadening the reach within communities and developing Local Network Plans setting out the longer-term aspirations for our many towns and villages. Over the coming months we will keep people updated as we develop Local Network structures.

Prior to the launch of Local Networks in 2025, AAPs will continue to deliver over the next year which will only be possible with the hard work of all involved. So a big thank you from me to fellow councillors, AAP Board members, partner organisations, members of the public and the AAP staff. I look forward to continuing to work with you all over the next 12 months.

Having served as a Board Member on the AAP for 10 years it has been an absolute honour to serve as Chair in my 11th year.

As in previous years the cost of living crisis has still presented many problems and issues for residents and those who work in Chester le Street area. This is an issue that has underpinned much of what has been supported through the AAP over the past 12 months in order to offer a broad range of support and activities for people locally. Some particular examples are the free events that have been supported such as Activity Week, Christmas Lights Switch on and events programme. The Fun and Food programme has also supported a range of activities for eligible children and young people across the AAP area. These have varied in nature offering our young people some exciting opportunities, while being supported with much needed healthy food during school holidays.

The successful allocation of Towns and Villages monies has seen a diverse range of projects supported in our communities, which have addressed issues across all eight Electoral Divisions in the AAP area. Working together has been key in maximising the impacts for our area and we can only do this with the support of our Partners and local people.

We have also faced some major challenges affecting our Town Centre which have been discussed in depth through the Board and Task Group. Managing the expectations and the impacts for Residents has been difficult, with the focus being on attempting to find solutions, which will need to continue moving forward.

There are also still challenges for us around mental health and wellbeing issues in the area. Work has been ongoing with partners on how this can be addressed and trying to ensure that the right provision is in place, and delivered in the right location for our residents as well as a focus on promotion of what is available.

The AAP as a whole have been at the heart of delivering some fantastic projects in Chester le Street area and as they transition into a Local Network, I look forward to working with staff, Board Members and partners going forward to ensure that success continues.

Neighbourhood Budget is an allocation of £19,400 (£14,000 capital and £5,400 revenue) that each County Councillor receives year on year to support community projects. The funding process is supported by the AAP Team.

In 2021/22 Councillors were centrally allocated £10,000 each from the Town & Villages Fund, which would form part of their NB allocation. This was allocated in the first year of term, to be used any time over their term of office. This was allocated in the first year term to be used by end of March 2024. This allocation is separate to their main NB allocation and was initially dealt with by the Towns & Villages Team.

The Difference We Have Made

Aspire to Learn (Aspire)

This project offered personalised learning and support experience for women across the AAP area. The focus was on helping women make positive life choices and provide them with the tools to get there. Since Covid-19, data has shown increased numbers of women being referred and self-referring to Aspire with issues including poor mental health, social exclusion, unemployment, poverty and an increase in disclosed domestic violence and abuse. This trend is reinforced by the referrals made to Aspire by partners in the Durham Mental Well Being Alliance.

This highlighted a need for a pilot project which would offer people extra individualised support to help them move forward and make positive life choices, encouraging women to become socially and economically included. A programme was developed, with small group numbers, to offer support and activities, offering weekly 1-2-1 support sessions and tracking personal progress towards clear goals. This also included classroombased sessions to try out a range of activities to develop good mental health, such as gardening, art, cooking, exercise and craft. All the activities were decided in agreement with the woman in the group. This approach has ensured that the programme is personalised to them.



The Difference We Have Made

Heaven's Kitchen (Lumley Methodist Church Hall)

The AAP responded to the cost-of-living crisis by ensuring that residents have access to warm food and food supplies.

The Heaven's Kitchen project increased the kitchen capacity at the Methodist Hall, so they were able to increase their luncheon club offer. This project provides a cooked meal and the opportunity to socialise with others, whilst supporting the residents' well-being.

The project also helped to improve additional provision such as the foodbank, mini-market and community fridge, so it can reach a wider community across the AAP area.



DurhamWorks

Durham Works (Durham County Council)

This project was able to set up a Chester-le-Street AAP Specialist Training and Equipment Budget (Flex Fund). This budget has been used to supply unemployed young people in the AAP area with everything they need to start work, college or training.

The budget helped to fund specialist equipment and courses that are not generally available. It also had a Discretionary Fund element, to be used to give wider access to training.
