Introduction

Portfolio Holder Statement

As the Cabinet portfolio holder for Economy and Partnerships I am happy to say that the overview of the Area Action Partnerships falls under my remit.

Over the last 13 years AAPs have helped local community organisations to thrive through practical support and funding. 2022/23 has been no different. The 14 AAPs across County Durham have helped to fund over 230 projects through their Area Budgets allocating £2.6m to these good causes. This is making a massive difference when like the rest of us, local organisations are being adversely impacted by the continued long term impacts of the Covid pandemic and the cost of living crisis.

County Durham is a diverse place, and each AAP is led and directed by local people, councillors, and partners. This means they can adapt to local circumstances whether they be in Wingate or Westgate, Castleside or Coxhoe. This local engagement means AAPs are firmly rooted in, and valued by their communities.

Throughout County Durham AAP funding has supported a wide variety of projects including, youth work, mental health support, environmental projects, activities for older people, sports clubs, children's play, village halls and community centres, parish councils, community safety initiatives and employment schemes, just to name a few.

The AAPs also support myself and my fellow councillors in allocating our annual Neighbourhood Budget. The 126 County Councillors have allocated over £2.2m to over 820 local projects in County Durham over the past year, again supporting a wide range of local schemes.

As with any service, it is always good practice to consider if any improvements can be made. Having remained largely unchanged for the last 14 years, the need for an independent view as to how the service might be enhanced led to the recently completed community engagement review. While consultation is still ongoing on the proposals contained in the review, it comes as no surprise that the consultants found many strengths of the AAPs that we could build upon in the future.

None of this would be possible without the dedication of AAP Boards, fellow councillors, partner organisations, members of the public and the AAP staff. So, thank you one and all. The AAPs would not be the success they have been without your continued support.


Great Aycliffe and Middridge Partnership

The Difference We Have Made





Lifeline Community Action secured a grant to support the organisation to open their existing Community Hub for an additional 2 days per week.

This project builds upon previously funded projects, providing support to individuals and families in the local area. The Hub offers support in the form of activity sessions, as well as advice and guidance for support services.

The funding also supports the employment of a package supervisor. This role allows the organisation to support more people, recruit more volunteers and provide stability for the organisation structure and react quickly to the needs of the local community, whilst continuing to provide care packages on a needs-basis in the local community.

Service users can be referred from organisations such as DCC Community Hub, Home Group, Families First, Local Schools, Livin Housing etc.



Greenfield Community College Greenfield Community College Uniform Fund

Greenfield School has benefitted from £6,750 for their Uniform Fund project. Due to the increasing cost-of-living crisis an emerging community issue has seen families struggling to provide school uniform, an issue we are keen to help with. The school increasingly noticed children attending school wearing wrong items of clothing and wanted to help.

The school have purchased a variety of items and as many full school uniforms as they can. The fund runs on an application basis, each application is needs assessed and once approved items are offered and given to students on a loan basis.

The project helps support other loan schemes funded by the school themselves, which include, a free breakfast club and loan of electronic devices such as l-pads.



Newton Aycliffe Neighbourhood Policing Team Newton Aycliffe Community Speedwatch Van

Newton Aycliffe Police have been awarded £20,000 for a Community Speedwatch Van project, which will see the purchase of a small van for use by speedwatch volunteers and members of the Neighbourhood Policing team.

The van will be used to deploy volunteers in target locations and will display suitable hazard graphics as a speeding deterrent. The van will also have its own bespoke automatic number plate recognition (ANPR) camera fitted to gather accurate vehicle data.

It will also provide a seating area, plug sockets and WiFi capability to act as a mobile office.

The Difference We Have Made



Learning a New Way CIC Wellbeing for All

Fun & Food funding was awarded to Learning a New Way CIC to deliver school holiday provision, including mindful craft activities, and a relax kids/ mindfulness session, along with healthy food.

The sessions give children a much-needed break from screen-time and an opportunity to socialise and be creative. The mindful craft activities give the children a hands-on experience as to how creativity can positively benefit their mood and overall wellbeing.

The Relax Kids/Mindfulness sessions introduce the children to strategies they can use to feel calmer and more confident. Techniques such as 'magic breathing', stretches, relaxation/meditation and positive affirmations are included.

Healthy food is provided at all sessions, ensuring the children have a nutritious meal - which is especially important in light of the increased cost of living and energy bill increases experienced by all families.



Glow Church UK

Glow Church UK secured a grant through GAMP's Area Budget to help fund their 'Glow Cares' project - an older people's social afternoon club for local residents.

The group provides a monthly vintage afternoon tea, in an effort to tackle social isolation and loneliness post-pandemic. The group offers free transport for participants who may otherwise be unable to attend.

Whilst attending the monthly event participants can also be signposted to other services such as financial agencies, housing-related support, welfare rights, and health services, with a view to providing advice and guidance. Wellbeing/Befriending telephone calls are made in between events, potentially identifying and preventing crisis situations with early intervention.

Feedback from the Glow Cares project

"What I love about coming here is there's no agenda," remarked one attendee, "I can sit and talk with friends about whatever comes up." People of all ages, both men and women, are attending sessions. The atmosphere is relaxed and the conversation flows freely. Volunteers are on hand to mix and mingle, and the team has a range of experience to bring to the conversation should it be needed, medical, social care, advocacy, recovery.

The project coordinator Glenis said, "I believe friendship has the power to enrich life. And making life better is what Coffee & Connect is all about."
