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Killhope

Going underground at Killhope

Take a trip underground and experience a taste of life as a Victorian lead miner at Killhope this summer.

The ever-popular museum is currently undergoing essential works but remains open to the public, offering a fantastic day out in a stunning location.

Although some areas are closed off to ensure the safety of visitors and staff while work is underway, the **visitor centre**, **café**, **mine** and other areas, including the **washing floor**, are still accessible.

The museum also continues to offer an exciting programme of workshops, performances and exhibitions as well as its famous mine tours.

The works, which are being funded through Arts Council England's Museum Estate and Development Fund, will see the repair, restoration and refurbishment of a number of buildings at the site which have been damaged by time and harsh weather.



The works will focus on the mine, launder, water bridges and mine cart ramp, while essential maintenance will also be undertaken on the Armstrong Water Wheel, thanks to funding from Weardale Area Action Partnership.

It is anticipated that all works will be completed by the autumn, ensuring Killhope continues to offer a fantastic experience for visitors of all ages.

Lighting the Jubilee Beacon

Sitting proudly in place on high ground above Durham City, a new Jubilee Beacon is offering a fitting tribute to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

Gifted from the Durham City Freeman, the 19-foot tall structure was designed and created by County Durham blacksmith Brian Russell at his Teesdale forge.

It will be lit to mark national events, including His Majesty King Charles III's coronation.

Our highways team prepared for its arrival by laying new footpaths and installing handrails to ensure the area, known as Jubilee Hill, is accessible to the public. Our clean and green team worked alongside them to trim back trees and hedges, while conservationists and ecologists surveyed the area at Aykley Heads to assess any likely impact on existing habitats.

STACK comes to County Durham

Two new leisure venues are on their way to County Durham as part of ambitious plans to revitalise our high streets.

Plans have now been approved for STACK venues in Bishop Auckland and Durham City. The developments will not only offer a place for people to eat, drink and be entertained, they will also provide opportunities for local food operators.

Unlike other STACK venues in the region, which have been based in shipping containers, the County Durham facilities will be created within existing developments but will still have the signature elements the brand has become known for.

It is hoped that STACK Bishop Auckland will open in spring 2024, with details of STACK Durham's opening set to be confirmed soon.

Raising the County Durham flag

The County Durham flag will be flown later this year to mark Historic County Flag Day. And this year is particularly special as it marks the 10th anniversary of the creation of the flag.

The flag was designed by twins Katie and Holly Moffatt, from Chilton, who were both 19 at the time, with help from their father James. The flag features the Cross of St Cuthbert, the patron saint of northern England who is buried at Durham Cathedral, and the coat of arms Palatinate colours of blue and yellow.



The flag was also raised earlier this year outside County Hall, in Durham, to mark County Durham Day, which falls on St Cuthbert's Day. The flag serves as a reminder of our rich history and celebrates the traditions that bind our community together.

New life for former rail route



Work is set to begin on improving active travel links between County Durham communities situated along the route of an historic railway.

We are currently developing new walking and cycling routes along a 19-kilometre stretch of the former Stockton and Darlington Railway.

More than £7 million from the government's Levelling Up Fund will be invested in the creation of walking and cycling paths which will run between Witton Park and our boundary with Darlington Borough, south of Newton Aycliffe.

The routes will take in the train stations of Shildon, Newton Aycliffe and Heighington and the National Cycle Network, as well as linking to Locomotion rail museum.

We are also hoping the route will include Gaunless Bridge, the world's first iron railway bridge, which was designed by 'father of the railways' George Stephenson. We recently secured funding from Historic England for the restoration of the bridge's abutments.

The new routes will be in place ahead of celebrations marking the 200th anniversary of the Stockton and Darlington Railway in 2025.

Improving County Durham's rural links

Residents of a County Durham village can now make the most of local transport links.

We have installed a one kilometre footpath leading from Fir Tree village to the Harperley roundabout on the A689, allowing pedestrians to enjoy walks out of the village or travel further afield using the accessible route to access the main bus service.

The project is one of several rural links to be enhanced across the county this year, with works also taking place at Fellside, Delves Lane, Mill Lane in Shincliffe, and Mainsforth.

Do you love our local landscape?

We need your help to make sure our public rights of way are fit for the 21st Century.

A public consultation on our fourth **Rights of Way Improvement Plan** is currently underway. The 10-year plan sets out how we will invest in outdoor routes for the benefit of residents and aims to ensure footpaths, bridleways and byways are accessible for all to enjoy.

Since the pandemic, working habits and how we spend our free time have changed, with people now spending more time in their local green spaces. We also know that many people now value more than ever before the benefits of spending time in the outdoors, for their mental and physical health.

We are hosting online consultation events on **Monday 5 June**, 2pm to 3pm, and on **Thursday 8 June**, 6.30pm to 7.30pm. The consultation closes at 5pm on **Wednesday 26 July**.

Refurbishing the Baileys

A street in the heart of Durham's World Heritage Site, which includes Durham Castle and Cathedral, is set to be brought back to its former glory.

Work to North and South Bailey, which will include footpath improvements, resurfacing of roads and the reinstatement of historic cobbles, is planned to commence summer 2023 and is set to be complete by late summer next year.

The road running through North and South Bailey dates back to the Middle Ages when it sat within the original castle walls. It is hoped the completed public realm works will retain and enhance the heritage characteristics of the area.

Similar work has already taken place on North Road, Old Elvet Bridge and Claypath.



Supporting community groups

Voluntary and community groups in the Great Aycliffe and Middridge areas are better able to support residents after receiving almost £150,000 in funding.

Our Great Aycliffe and Middridge Area Action Partnership (AAP) has awarded £146,652 to 14 groups to enable them to provide a wide range of activities, social groups, drop-in sessions and days out.



Youth panel approves grants

Young people in County Durham are being given the opportunity to have a final say on funding for community projects.


3 Towns Partnership's (AAP) newly-formed Youth Panel gathered for the first time to assess applications for its Children and Young People's Small Grants fund.

Jointly managed by the AAP and the Youth Panel, the fund awards grants of between £200 and £500 to organisations for projects for children and young people up to age 19.



A year in numbers

It's been another busy year for our Towns and Villages programme. Below is a look at the project's last year in numbers. Additional projects that are still underway, will further boost these figures further, with £1.3 million of grant awards helping to create 71 jobs and lever £2.1 million of private investment.



Reaching the heart of our communities

Communities across the county are benefitting from more than £2 million of investment awarded by our Area Action Partnerships (AAP) through the Towns and Villages project.

Each of the 14 AAPs has been awarded £210,000 to support projects to revitalise towns and villages in their area, while additional funding has been made available through elected members.

So far, more than ± 1 million of funding has been awarded, with 57 projects having received support and a further 64 projects in the pipeline. The programme has also helped us attract almost $\pm 500,000$ in additional private investment to support communities.

Great Aycliffe Garden Guild is one project to have benefitted, receiving more than £41,000 plus match funding of £5,000 from both Livin and

Brightwater to create a Gardeners' Guild run by local volunteers on the Clarence Char Allotment Site. The project aims to inspire people to engage in sustainable gardening and provide a safe educational community space where people can share ideas and support each other.





Coronation celebrations

Celebrations have been taking place across County Durham this month to mark the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III.

Durham Cathedral was lit up in red, white and blue over the bank holiday weekend and an image of the new monarch was projected onto Durham Town Hall and Bishop Auckland Town Hall.

A number of trees have also been planted in our parks, with the King's oak trees planted at Hardwick Park, in Sedgefield; Wharton Park, in Durham; and Riverside Park, in Chester-le-Street. As well as creating a lasting legacy to His Majesty, the trees will benefit future generations and contribute towards our efforts to tackle climate change.

With many communities also coming together to mark the historic event, we've delved into the archives of Durham County Record Office to see how the celebrations compare with past coronation parties in the county.

Other festivities included community events, such as The Hawthorn Float.

Meanwhile, free trips to London for the coronation of both King George VI and Queen Elizabeth II were advertised for 50 'North Country' women who entered the Lingfords coronation recipe competition.

Two free trips were also offered to the grocer whose customer sent in the best recipes, with Lingfords 'Coronation Assortments' packs, containing baking products and recipe competition leaflets on the reverse of the adverts.

1937

Shop fronts were also decorated in 1937 for the coronation of His Majesty King George VI.

The Co-op store in Station Town (L) and Doggarts Department Store in Wingate (R) were two examples of stores commemorating the day.



In 1911, His Majesty King George V took to the throne.

Many stores, such as MD Laws Newsagent, in Front Street, Haswell, were decorated in an elaborate fashion to celebrate the occasion.


It was a memorable day for children across the county. It's thought this photograph was taken outside the Tin School, in Blackhall, where youngsters celebrated the day together.






In Sedgefield, a number of trees were planted in honour of the day. This map shows the trees which were planted as well as the names of those



sponsoring each tree, while the aerial photo shows the town as it looked years later, in 1992, with some of the Coronation trees on display.



With so many activities taking place, some towns and villages even commissioned special souvenir programmes listing the events that were being held over several days to celebrate the coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. In Barnard Castle, these events included religious services, children's races, cricket matches and an 'old people's tea'. Souvenirs were also distributed to local children.

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The streets of County Durham will come alive with the sound of brass music for a full week this summer.

Durham Brass Festival returns from **Sunday 9 to Sunday 16 July** and is always a highlight of our annual events programme.

Spectacular performances are in store, with new commissions, free concerts, workshops, community activities, and a full programme of lively street bands.



Opening the show

New Zealand-based Fat Freddy's Drop will open this year's Brass festivities at Gala Durham on Monday 10 July.

Internationally renowned for live music performances, the sevenpiece band is inspired by each member's individual musical influences from reggae and soul, disco and house, to rock and rhythm and blues.

With a career spanning over 1,000 shows, Fat Freddy's Drop has clocked up more than 500 appearances in Europe, 34 Australian tours and more than 325 shows in its New Zealand homeland. It has also built a loyal audience of fans - the "Fred Heads" - and boasts more than half a million followers on social media. Last year, the band performed headline festival shows all over Europe, including a sold-out performance at Alexandra Palace in London and a headliner appearance at Sidney Myer Music Bowl for the Melbourne International Jazz Festival.

Celebrating an animated classic

This year marks the 30th anniversary of *Wallace & Gromit: The Wrong Trousers* and fans of the Oscar-winning classic are in for a treat. The Fairey Band (pictured above) will be playing the accompaniment to the film in a special performance at Gala Durham on Saturday 15 July.

The Fairey Band was founded in 1937 by a group of employees at the Fairey Aviation Works in Stockport and has since gone on to become one of the most successful contesting brass bands in the world, winning every elite event on the contest calendar. Known for its unique 'Fairey sound', the band has teamed up with animators Aardman to bring this exclusive performance to UK audiences this year. The 30-minute film tells the tale of eccentric inventor, Wallace, and his beloved canine companion as they overcome an unexpected house guest.





Durham Brass Festival



Taking a trip back in time

Described as "a long overdue marriage of two art forms", silent film and brass band music will be brought together in a special event at Gala.

The event, on Sunday 16 July, will see the world-famous Brighouse & Rastrick Brass Band play a live brass accompaniment to a new silent film, Echoes of the North.

Made from more than a hundred fragments of archive film, Echoes of the North invites audiences to travel down the highways and byways of northern life over a century ago, exploring its industries and rural life, wartimes and festivals, national holidays and huge city-wide occasions.

It's the first ever all-brass soundtrack for a silent film.

Acclaimed composer, musician, writer and broadcaster, Neil Brand, who wrote the score, said: *"The wonderful, resonant images of people going about their lives, work, play and conflict in the first 30 years of the last century spring to life with the timeless beauty of the brass band sound, music that evolves and matches every contrasting mood for us today, just as it could have done when these scenes were shot.*

"I am thrilled to have had the opportunity to create scores for these images, and to work with one of the greatest bands in the world."

Audiences will also be treated to a concert of brass band favourites ahead of the showing of the 60-minute film.

This special event is co-commissioned by Yorkshire Silent Film Festival and Durham Brass with support from the PRS Foundation's Open Fund for Organisations, and Arts Council England.

Participants can explore our historic towns, charming villages and valleys and our magnificent shoreline with a dedicated walk leader. There are walks to suit everyone, from long hikes to pleasant strolls. There's the chance to improve your knowledge of the county's wide variety of plants and foliage or learn more about our geological heritage.

Upcoming walk locations include **Pikeston Fell and Sharnberry Gill**, and **Cotherstone and Lartington Park**, next to the beautiful Barnard Castle.

Take a mindful walk

A mindful walk in the great outdoors can help us take a moment to reflect and connect to the world around us. It can also improve our mood, reduce feelings of stress or anger, and help us take time out of the day to feel more relaxed.

In County Durham, we're lucky to have a vast and varied landscape with lots of opportunities to get out and about and soak up what nature has to offer. Visit <u>www.durham.gov.uk/countryside</u> so see our list of country parks, nature reserves, railway paths and picnic areas.

Next time you head out, why not take a moment and tune into your senses.

Ask yourself:

What can I hear? Perhaps there is birdsong or the rustling of trees.

What can I see? Look high, look low. Look for cloud formations or birds flying overhead. Take a closer look at flowers or shrubs.

What can I smell? Damp, rainy days smell different to dry, warm days. Take some deep relaxing breaths as you walk.

What can I feel? Pick up natural materials, such as pinecones and connect through touch.

Making the North Pennines more accessible

The North Pennines offers a stunning landscape of open moors and peatland, dales and meadows, wonderful woods and tumbling upland rivers across parts of County Durham, Northumberland and Cumbria. The North Pennines AONB Partnership is working to make this protected upland landscape more accessible to people of all ages and abilities.

Off-road, all-terrain mobility scooters, known as trampers, are available to rent at five North Pennines sites. The trampers can cross rougher ground and will allow people to explore further than traditional scooters, wheelchairs or other modes of transport. They are simple to operate, with a twist grip handle used for acceleration and braking. Full in-depth training will be provided on your first rental of the scooter.

Trampers are available at the following locations:

* Killhope Lead Mining Museum, Weardale. 1 route, 0.5km around the museum grounds, 30mins.

***** High Force Hotel, Teesdale. 1 route, 1.2km return to waterfall, less than 1 hour.

* Bowlees Visitor Centre, Teesdale. Route 1, 2.2km along a picturesque, track with views across the dale, 1 hour. Route 2, 1km route down to Low Force waterfalls, 30mins. Route 3, 1.1km to Bowlees Quarry, 30mins.

* Talkin Tarn Country Park, Brampton, Carlisle. 1 route, 2.2km around the tarn, 1 hour.

* Derwent Reservoir, Consett. Route 1, 7km from Visitor Centre to Millshield Car, 2 hours 30 mins. Route 2, 6.8km from Visitor Centre – Pow Hill Country Park, just over 2 hours.

One tramper is available at each site, but they must be booked in advance.

An annual membership of ± 10 is required in order to use the trampers or there is the option of a two-week trial membership for ± 2.50 .

Supporting County Durham's foster carers

There are many children and young people who need loving homes across the county. While foster carers make a significant difference to their lives, it can be a challenging role. We're offering even greater support to foster families through an award-winning programme led by The Fostering Network.

The **Mockingbird programme** offers peer support, guidance and social activities to families, helping them to strengthen their relationships in the same way an extended family offers help and support.

Led by a hub home carer and liaison worker, each Mockingbird community supports between six and 10 foster families and is available nearly 24/7. As well as offering support to carers, home hub carers offer sleepovers and social activities to children and young people to build their resilience and confidence.

The programme has proved a huge success, with statistics showing around 18 per cent of placements would have broken down without it.

Sharing their successes

Jen and Mike are our first home hub carers in County Durham, having been in the role for six months. "We haven't stopped smiling since we were appointed," says Jen. "We love that no two weeks are ever the same and I especially enjoy organising our set socials and support groups."

In the short time they have acted as home hub carers, they have already seen the benefit of the Mockingbird project. *"For us, we have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know all of the children and young people on a personal level,"* adds Jen. *"We love to share their successes but also be there for them and their carers in their hour of need.*

"The children are finding new like-minded friends, learning from one another and sharing similar experiences. They love to come together at the hub for pizza-making nights, play dates and more."

And it isn't just the children who benefit, as Jen explains. "All the carers involved reach out to each other now as well as leaning on us as the hub home. They support each other where they can and, though there have been some sad and challenging times for families, everyone has been so supportive."

The festival is always a big hit, with last year's event pulling in more than 30,000 visitors across the weekend.


And this year it's set to be a cracker.

We're currently trialling new technology to help our residents report fly-tipping more easily.

When reporting an incident of fly-tipping on our Do It Online system, members of the public can now use the reference from the What3Words app, which breaks areas down into a grid and allocates three unique words to each three-metre square area.

This will allow residents to report locations accurately by providing the three words for the area. The technology behind the app syncs with our current systems, making it easier than ever to let us know exactly where rubbish has been dumped.


Electric Vehicle charge points

Our plans to expand the county's electric vehicle charging infrastructure have received a further boost with the announcement of £3.2 million of funding from the government.

We are one of only three councils to receive the funding, and the news follows the announcement last year that we were one of nine local authorities to be awarded funding through the LEVI (Local Electric Vehicle Infrastructure) pilot to install 100 electric vehicle charge points.

Having already received £1.25 million to plan and install an initial 100 charging points, we will now be able to increase the total number of charging points in the county to 250, including 60 rapid chargers.

Work is ongoing to install the first of the 100 charging points across the county from this summer, with plans also in place to develop the next 150 sites. Find out more at www.durham.gov.uk/electricvehicles



Gul-e Project

Around 6.6 million households across the UK have no access to off-street parking and, as a result, are unable to charge electric vehicles at home. We are in the process of identifying streets and communities within the county which would benefit from a new Gul-e system.

The Gul-e system will see cable gullies installed under pavements in terraced areas and villages where on-street charging is not possible. This will allow residents living in these areas to charge their vehicles overnight, while keeping cabling out of the way of pedestrians and reducing network grid pressures.

Violet Elliot was 17 when she first started volunteering with us. Planning to study for a Level 3 Diploma in Travel and Tourism at New College, she was keen to gain some experience in the area. And, after spending many years swimming at Freeman's Quay for her school and Durham City, she felt it was the perfect place to volunteer.



What a journey!

With the support of the team at the centre, Violet began learning the role of a leisure attendant last

summer and was offered the opportunity to work towards a lifeguard qualification. Violet was extremely keen to take on the extra challenge but, being neurodivergent, which means that her different thinking style can affect how she communicates, she was worried she wouldn't be able to absorb the information.

Violet:

"I was in tears after the first day, but as the weeks progressed, I proved myself wrong and passed the course with flying colours," she said.

Violet is particularly grateful for the support she received from those around her. "I worked hard, but I was actively encouraged to do so by the team," she said. "I felt the support and positivity of everyone around me and, after achieving my pool lifeguard qualification through the volunteer scheme, I gained casual employment as a leisure assistant. What a journey!"

The whole experience has proved to be positive for Violet, offering her invaluable experience. *"It's helped make me more confident and shown that I can achieve,"* said Violet. *"This wouldn't have been possible without the volunteer programme or the caring staff running it, so I would encourage everyone to think about giving it a go."*

Sharing lives, sharing hearts

Our Shared Lives scheme supports adults and young people who are not able to live on their own. It offers them a safe, secure home and the love and stability of family life. Five years after opening up their home through the initiative, Lorraine and Paul Finnegan tell us why they've never looked back.

When Lorraine and Paul first heard about **Shared Lives**, they knew straight away that it was something they wanted to be part of.

And now, Joyce, Judith and David all live with the couple on a permanent basis, after Lorraine and Paul first provided each of them with an emergency or respite placement.

"It's like spending time with your best friends every day," said Lorraine. "Anybody can become a provider – as long as you have room in your house and in your heart. It is fantastic."

Providers share their home and family life with a person who needs care and support, whether that be through a long-term, short-term, respite or emergency placement. They also support them to develop and maintain independent living skills and friendships, giving them a sense of wellbeing in a safe and supportive environment.

Lorraine and Paul say they are grateful for the support they get on a day-today basis from the service. *"Even* though we have experience of being a Shared Lives provider, we don't know everything, so it is ideal to have people there who support you and are on hand quickly for anything you need," said Paul.

The couple say that the most rewarding aspect of becoming a provider is seeing the change in those who live with them. Seventy-fiveyear-old Joyce has become much more confident during the five years she has lived with the couple.

"When Joyce first arrived, she was very quiet," said Paul. "Now, her confidence is unreal. She has opened up and grown so much and it's amazing to see how happy she is.

"Watching people grow and flourish is wonderful," Lorraine agrees. "They bring love and laughter every day and, for us, it's about giving them opportunities and being able to see them enjoy themselves."

Seeing the positive impact of Shared Lives on Lorraine and Paul has even inspired a family member and two of their friends to become providers. *"They see how much fun we have,"* said Lorraine. *"We go abroad, have days out and do everything with them. We have a really happy house and it's great that it has*

encouraged others to open their homes too."

Respite care and short breaks

For families of children with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND), life can sometimes feel overwhelming.

Our Short Breaks scheme provides time out for carers and the opportunity for children and young people to develop new skills, socialise and make new friends.

A dedicated team works with parents and carers to find a break that best suits the whole family. This could range from children attending a virtual activity or visiting a leisure facility for a few hours each week to a child attending a residential setting.

'An exciting part of his week'

We work closely with our partners to offer as many opportunities for families as possible. One of our partners, Integrating, is based in Chester-le-Street and offers a range of fun and safe services to children and young people aged between five and 25. It works with around 90 young people each year, delivering more than

10,000 activity hours during term-time and school holidays.

Helen's son has attended Integrating for several years now. "It has become an exciting part of his week and school holidays," explains Helen. "He has anxiety and learning difficulties and Integrating is the only place he will go without me. As a single carer, these windows of space to breathe, while I know he is safe and having fun, have been invaluable."

Helen finds it a relief to know that her son is taking part in activities during his time at Integrating and says it's made huge a difference to him. "We understand how lucky we are to have this service," said Helen. "It has hugely increased my son's confidence and scaffolded a more independent life, while repeat visits to certain venues means he is more familiar with local spaces now."
