# Our crossing patrol staff rock!

These hardy souls turn out, come rain or shine, to help children and their families get to and from school safely.

And, as it's the 70th anniversary of the service, we've been holding a series of "thank you" events for them.

Each event has had a presentation ceremony, with staff receiving a

certificate, commemorative badge and a platinum jubilee cupcake.

This fantastic photograph was taken at the last of the events, which was held at Durham County Hall.

More commonly known as "lollipop ladies" or "lollipop men", our crossing patrol staff hold a special place in the hearts of our local communities. We currently employ more than 130 of them, and their ages range from 32 to 78!

Six of them have been on patrol for more than 30 years, and three of them have clocked up more than 25 years' service.

These long-serving stalwarts will have helped generations of the same family get to and from school safely.

We're regularly on the lookout for new crossing patrol staff at locations across the county and would love to hear from anybody who might be interested in joining us.

# **Changes to benefits**

The Department of Work and Pensions and HM Revenue and Customs are currently moving benefit claimants across from tax credits to Universal Credit.

If you receive Working Tax Credit or Child Tax Credit, you may receive a **Managed Migration Notice**. This is to inform you that your tax credits are set to end and that you need to claim Universal Credit.

It is important that you read the notice and submit your claim. You will not automatically be transferred to Universal Credit, your Managed Migration Notice will give you a deadline of at least three months.

If you need a deadline extension because of personal circumstances, you can call the telephone number on the letter to request more time.

If the amount of Universal Credit would be less than your tax credits you can get a top-up which means you are not worse off at the point of transfer.

# Broadband and phone social tariffs

If you are on a low-income you may be eligible for a social tariff to help pay for your broadband and



phone. These tariffs are usually cheaper than typical broadband tariffs, starting at just £12 per month. They are also usually exempt from price rises or exit fees.

The UK telecoms regulator, Ofcom, estimates that 4.2 million households in the UK are eligible. You're likely to be eligible for a social tariff if you receive a means-tested state benefit, such as Universal Credit, Pension Credit or legacy equivalents.

# **Durham Superstar 2023**

### A museum engager who has gone above and beyond to help visitors and his colleagues for almost 40 years has been crowned Durham Tourism Superstar 2023.

Ian Bean, of Beamish, The Living Museum of the North, secured the most public votes in the annual competition. Organised by the council's tourism service, Visit County Durham, the contest celebrates the shining stars of the county's tourism industry.

Ian first volunteered at Beamish Museum 37 years ago, when he was 20 years old. He has taken on many different roles at the popular attraction and is now employed as an engager in the 1900s Town.

From riding penny farthings, restoring vintage vehicles and taking part in Suffragette rallies to helping deliver sessions for people living with dementia and playing the street organ - lan is a man of many talents. He even appeared in the Downton Abbey film and has clocked up more than 300,000 views on the social media platform TikTok as Penny Farthing Guy.

"I'm elated and stunned to have won Durham Tourism Superstar," lan said. "Thank you very much to everyone who voted for me. It's absolutely fantastic. It's an honour to be nominated in the first place and to be shortlisted down to five and then to win is overwhelming."

Ian will now go forward as Visit County Durham's nomination for the Visit England and Mirror Travel national Tourism Superstar contest.

# £1 billion visitor economy

Tourism contributed more than £1 billion to County Durham's economy for the first time ever in 2022, latest industry research has revealed.

Last year, 17.9 million people visited the county, spending a record-breaking £1.04 billion. This is an increase of 25.6 per cent on 2021 and 8.76 per cent on 2019 and demonstrates how the county's visitor economy is back on track following the coronavirus pandemic.

Visit County Durham, our tourism service, has welcomed the results, attributing the £1 billion milestone to the innovation and resilience of the sector along with strategic work to develop Durham's visitor offer and attract investment.

And while visitor numbers have not yet reached prepandemic levels, ongoing activity to promote the area through national and international marketing campaigns is encouraging visitors to stay longer and see and do more in Durham. This has resulted in higher spending in the local economy, creating a positive outlook for future sustainable economic growth.



# Living long and healthy lives

The County Durham Health and Wellbeing Board has launched its new strategy to inform and influence decisions which have an impact on the health and wellbeing of our residents.

The strategy aims to ensure that we are working together with our communities, to give everyone in County Durham an equal opportunity to live a long and healthy life. Our priorities include making smoking history, enabling healthy weight for all, improving mental health, and reducing harm caused by alcohol.

# **Cotherstone Old Chapel**

Cotherstone residents are celebrating after completing the purchase of a disused chapel which they plan to turn it into a community-run shop, café and heritage centre.

Residents raised more than £115,000 towards the project and we have contributed £120,000 through our Towns and Villages Community Resilience Fund.

A further £20,000 has been awarded by local councillors from their neighbourhood budgets and Teesdale Area Action Partnership has given an additional £40,000.



Now that the group have purchased the chapel, they will now embark on a programme of renovations and improvements to create the shop, café and heritage centre.



# Reducing flooding in Stanley

Residents of South Stanley and Craghead are helping us to reduce flooding and create more sustainable communities.

Climate change is leading to more extreme weather, with flooding becoming more frequent. Our highways team carries out a regular programme of works to reduce the risk of flooding, and they are also on standby to deal with emergencies.

However, innovative solutions like those being explored by The Community Sustainable Drainage (SuDS) project could make a huge difference.

The aim is to make urban drainage systems work more effectively with the natural water cycle. This can help reduce flooding but also provide green infrastructure benefits such as improved air quality, amenity and health benefits, and also encourage greater biodiversity.

A five-year community-led project in South Stanley is already seeing the concept in action.

# Checking voter information

All households across the county should now have received a form asking them to check information held on the electoral register.



The forms, which have been sent via post and email, are issued as part of our annual canvass. We carry out the canvass in order to keep the electoral register up to date.

It also helps us identify any residents who are not registered to vote so we can then remind how they can register.

You do not need to take action any action if the details for your household are correct. However, it is important that everyone follows the instructions on the form.

# Family Hubs launched

Families in County Durham can now get advice and support on all sorts of family matters in one place, thanks to our new Family Hubs.

The hubs bring together staff from NHS health visitor, midwifery and mental health support services along with our own family support teams. They also link up with community groups offering services such as support for young dads.

Family hubs are there for anyone in the family, from before baby arrives up until young people reach 19 years old – or 25 if they have a special educational need or disability.

The hubs offer a wide range of free courses and information on topics including:

expecting a baby

family relationships

- baby feeding and weaning
- helping children learn and develop well
- feeding your family, including vouchers to help buy healthy food
- childcare
- help with your money

And there are lots of fun activities for families, where children can play and grown-ups can meet other families, have a cuppa and have a chat with our friendly teams.

# Starting school

# Will your child be turning five between 1 September 2024 and 31 August 2025?

If so, you will need to complete an online application telling us which school you would like your child to attend from September 2024.

Visit <u>www.durham.gov.uk/schooladmissions</u> where you can access a useful guide to help with your application. We encourage you to apply online wherever possible but, if you are unable to do so, paper application forms are available on request.

If your child attends the nursery unit attached to the school you wish them to attend or if they have a sibling at the school, you will still need to submit an application form.

You will also need to apply for a place in Year 3 if your child attends an infant school which operates separately to the junior school you wish them to attend.

Applications open 5 September 2023 and close midnight 15 January 2024.

Join us for a weekend of spellbinding books and fascinating conversation, when Durham Book Festival returns to Gala Durham and Clayport Library this October.





On Friday 13 October, we will welcome one of the nation's best-loved food writers, **Grace Dent**, as she celebrates the release of her new book *Comfort Eating*.



You can explore poetry and story with poet **David Spittle** or learn how to carve out the time to write and get those ideas down on the page with Northumberland writer **Caro Giles**.



# Care working

# Care to make a difference?

Care workers in County Durham support some of our most vulnerable residents. For many, like Sheena and Jamie, the inspiration to become a care worker came caring for their own families.

# Jamie's story

Jamie Richardson was raised by his grandparents and at 16 wanted to become a police officer, but when his grandad got cancer, he became a carer instead. It inspired him so much that two years later, after his grandad passed away, he decided to pursue a career in care.

With support from the County Durham Care Academy, Jamie from Esh Winning was able to complete training and get a rewarding job caring for people in their own homes.

*"It's a big responsibility but I really love my job because those I look after are all lovely people,"* he said. *"You really get used to being with them, and they become like your family after a while."* 





# Sheena's story

Sheena Bryson has been a care worker for more than 30 years and is currently a homecare and support worker at the Orchards in Brandon.

One of our Extra Care facilities, the Orchards offers older people, and people with needs associated with old age, a supportive way of living independently.

"I've got a caring personality," says Sheena. "I looked after my parents and wanted to go into nursing initially but changed my mind when I went into a care home to get a bit of background experience. I liked it so much that I stayed. I like to be helpful to people and I think that is very important in this line of work.

### The best part of the day for me is knowing that I'm making a difference to someone's life...

"Sometimes my day starts quite early, going round and seeing that everyone is ok, helping tenants with their breakfast medication and personal care. But we also have time to come down and do fun things like the weekly exercise class. The best part of the day for me is knowing that I'm making a difference to someone's life and that I've provided the best service that I possibly can."

Extra Care tenants have their own flat in a specially designed housing complex with 24-hour care and support available on site. This offers the independence of having your own home with the benefit of on-site personal care and support to meet your assessed need.

There are Extra Care schemes based around the county in Barnard Castle, Consett, Crook, Ouston, Seaham and Spennymoor.

# Have your say

Involving residents in helping to shape our services is one of the most important things we can do. By consulting with people and listening to what they have to say, we gain valuable information which can help us to find solutions, make better decisions and ensure we meet the needs of communities.

This year we've asked you about a range of important issues, including: our approach to community engagement across the county; proposed changes to our home to school transport service; opening hours for some of our Customer Access Points; and the expansion of a Public Space Protection Orders to deal with issues arising from irresponsible dog ownership.

Your feedback has had an impact. Views shared on our approach to community engagement highlighted the need to build on the current strengths and practices of our Area Action Partnerships. Meanwhile, proposals to introduce a seasonal dog ban on Seaham's small slope beach was not taken forward after consultation showed there was little support for it.

# Council budget proposals

We are now asking for your views on our budget proposals for 2024/25 as well as gathering your thoughts on how we meet the financial challenges we face over the next four years.

Like all councils, we are facing unavoidable financial pressures driven by rising costs and increasing levels of demand, particularly for adult and children's social care. In total 47 per cent of our budget is spent on social care, providing support to 2.5 per cent of the population. It is becoming more challenging to balance budgets with the funding received from the Government and the income we are allowed to raise locally.

Despite some additional government funding and assuming that there will be continued annual increases in Council Tax, we forecast that we will still need to make £56 million in savings over the next four years, with savings of £12.1 million required next year.

Although we will continue to maximise savings and efficiencies in management and administration

services, it is becoming increasingly difficult to do this. We have always sought to minimise the impact on front line services, however, without further funding from Government, some of these services will be more affected in the coming years.

We have already agreed £2.2 million of savings for next year, and we are now consulting on proposals to save a further £3.7 million. That would still leave us with a £6.2 million shortfall for 2024/25, so we are also seeking your views on where we could make these savings, as well as the savings we'll need to make in future years.

To help our most vulnerable households, we are also proposing to extend our Local Council Tax Reduction Scheme in its existing form for another year. This scheme offers a Council Tax discount to eligible residents on low incomes whether in work, unemployed or retired.



# Celebrating 75 years of Peterlee

In 1948, the Peterlee Development Corporation was set up to coordinate the building of a New Town in east Durham. Named after a prominent miners' leader, Peterlee was unique in being the only new town to have come about following a request to the government by local people.

Seventy-five years later, we're celebrating their success in ensuring Peterlee was one of 10 English new towns in the first wave of the programme.

# The Living Memory Project

### We want to tell the story of Peterlee through the eyes of its residents.


Through our Living Memory Project, we're asking people to share their personal photos, memorabilia and related stories about living in the town, so that we can bring them all together.

Pensioner John Nelson is among those who have already contributed to the project. Now 84-years-old, John was involved in the construction of the first phases of Peterlee. He now lives in the last remaining cantilever house in the town, unaltered from its original design.

John's father Wilfred was one of the first builders to work in Peterlee and, upon leaving school at 15, John followed in his footsteps and joined the construction industry.

In 1960, John was involved in the building of shops along Burnhope Way and Yoden Way, when the town received a visit from Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and the Duke of Edinburgh. John managed to catch a glimpse of the royal car from the upper windows of the shops as it drove past.










**Peterlee:** The Place to Be

Earlier in the year we launched a unique photography exhibition, called Peterlee: The Place to Be, at Castle Dene shopping centre.

The public exhibition features more than 100 photographs and working drawings telling the story of how the town came to be.

The exhibition will on display until Saturday 28 October.



"When the estate was built in the early 1960s, there were ten of these cantilever style houses," John said. "Ours is the only one

remaining, which is something Anne and I are very proud of. We feel very lucky because there is so much green open space around us, front and back. It's one of the reasons that we've never wanted to leave.

"Despite the fact that I've worked and lived in Peterlee for the best part of my life, there's still a lot in the Peterlee 75 exhibitions that I wasn't previously aware of. There's also a lot that I do remember, however, which is great to see. It brings back memories and Anne and I have started looking through our old photographs."

John has contributed photographs of himself and his father from the 1950s and 1960s for the Living Memory Project, which will go on display later in the year.

# Recycling medical equipment

Did you know you can now recycle medical equipment at our Household Waste Recycling Centres?

We are working with Medequip and HW Martin, which manages our household waste recycling centres, on a new scheme which aims to save the NHS money and get unused medical equipment back into service. We have installed new drop off skips at our Coxhoe, Middleton-in-Teesdale, Horden, Potterhouse Lane at Pity Me, Seaham and Romanway at Bishop Auckland sites where people can donate unused medical equipment which they have been loaned by the NHS. Examples of items you can donate include, walking frames, crutches and aids to help people sit in the bath.

Once the equipment is dropped off, it is collected by Medequip who sterilise and mend it and get it back into circulation to people who need it.

Prepare yourself for a transformative experience as more than 30 spectacular light installations reimagine Durham's historic buildings, streets and waterways for four nights only. Produced by leading arts producers Artichoke, Lumiere is commissioned by the county council, with funding from Arts Council England and additional support from a raft of other funders and supporters. Open to all and completely free to attend, Lumiere has attracted more than a million visitors since 2009. Now a landmark occasion in the North East calendar, this year's event promises to further raise the stakes with big name artists and exclusive UK premieres.

Beyond the lights, Lumiere continues to support the city and county's economy as well as local residents. This year, Lumiere will provide new opportunities for the community to get involved and showcase County Durham's creativity on a national platform, including through the return of the BRILLIANT scheme. Focused on showcasing North East and UK talent, the competition offers the opportunity for anyone with a bright idea to make and exhibit an artwork.

### Lumiere Durham is open from 4.30pm to 11pm each night.

You do not need a ticket to attend Lumiere 2023. Free Peak-time tickets are only required between 4.30pm to 7.30pm. Enjoy Lumiere without a ticket after this time.

County Durham residents can book peak-time tickets from **10am on Tuesday 3 October**. Tickets go on general release to the wider public at 10am on Wednesday 4 October.

# Step into a world of light – Lumiere highlights

# **Illuminated Bottle Rack**

### Ai Weiwei, CHINA

An extraordinary work by one of the world's best-known artists. The piece, which features 61 antique chandeliers, will be housed inside Durham Cathedral's Chapter House. This will be the first time this intricate piece, created in 2018, has been shown in the UK. The immense structure was inspired by Marcel Duchamp's readymade Bottle Rack, and uses the object of an everyday, but enormous, upside-down bottle rack as its chandelier branches.

# Here in County Durham, we are aiming to make it easier for you to leave your car at home when making everyday journeys.

We want to make it simpler, safer and more fun to travel actively, whether it be by walking, wheeling or cycling. There is lots of work going on all over the county to improve our network of paths and cycling routes. So why not hop on your bike to visit the local shop, or walk to see your friends instead of driving?

# **National Cycle Network**

A £1.5 million upgrade of our main cycling, wheeling and walking route has been completed, with a new glow in the dark section among the improvements made. We have worked with Sustrans to deliver the improvements on the National Cycle Network route (NCN1). The Department for Transport-funded work has taken place on sections of the NCN1 between Seaham and Pesspool Wood near Haswell. The NCN 1 is managed by the charity Sustrans and runs form Dover to the Shetland Islands, with a 23-mile stretch running through County Durham.

## **Borrow a Bike**

People living or working in Bishop Auckland, Chester-le-Street, Meadowfield and Seaham can now borrow a bike for free thanks to the extension of our Borrow a Bike scheme, which offers people the opportunity to borrow a bike for up to three months, free of charge. It aims to encourage people to cycle to and from work, though the bikes can also be used for leisure purposes. It is already available to people who live or work in Shildon, Newton Hall, Framwellgate Moor, Brasside, Pity Me, Stanley, Murton and Newton Aycliffe.

# Transforming travel in Durham City

We're working hard to improve travel to and from Durham City. We want to make it easier for people to access the city, but we're also working to reduce congestion and emissions by encouraging more active travel.



Durham City's new state of the art bus station is starting to take shape.

The steel frame of the new building on North Road is now complete and floors, staircases and lift shafts have been installed. The main roof of the building, which is on the site of the old bus station, has been put in place and external stone cladding work is currently underway.

The concourse to the rear of the building has been excavated and a new drainage system has been



installed, while construction of the access road is well advanced.

Over the coming months, work will take place to complete the construction of internal walls and install a green roof and green wall. The project has experienced some delays due to unforeseen and unavoidable issues, but it is hoped that the new bus station will be open by November, with work to reinstate the road and footpath following over the winter.

# New coach drop-off point

A new coach drop-off point has opened in Durham, welcoming visitors to the historic city centre and providing an improved experience for coach parties.

The site, which replaces the former drop-off point at Freeman's Place, is based on the opposite side of the River Wear at Framwelgate Waterside. The new location will help manage traffic in the city centre and also provide a vastly improved experience for visitors, who will be greeted by a spectacular view of the UNESCO World Heritage Sites of Durham Cathedral and Castle.

The new drop-off/pick-up bay has space for up to four coaches with a 20 min short-stay parking restriction. Footpaths next to the parking area have been enlarged to accommodate the additional footfall anticipated.

The Cathedral bus has been rerouted to serve Framwelgate Waterside.

### The new bus station will provide first class facilities for travellers, serving as a major transport hub for both the city and county. It is hoped that it will help attract both shoppers and tourists to the city, supporting its independent

# Exploring new opportunities

### If you're newly unemployed and don't know where to start, if you're looking for a change of direction or simply want to secure a new job as soon as possible, we can help – just as we helped Debbie.

Debbie is a single mum to three young children, who recently returned to the North East to raise her family. Debbie had previously been a support worker, but had a keen interest in art and design, having completed qualifications in the subject.

Due to childcare needs and family circumstances, Debbie found it difficult to find employment that suited the hours she needed to work. She sought support from **Enterprise Made Simple** (EMS), to explore the option of setting up her own business and they signposted her to Employability Durham.

During Debbie's first appointment, an initial assessment was carried out to identify her skills and experience and any barriers to employment. A plan was then written up which identified goals and the steps needed to achieve them.

Due to the nature of the business Debbie wanted to set up, she required equipment to create products to sell. She had raised the funds to purchase some herself and secured additional funding to purchase the rest of the equipment through our flexible fund. Debbie has now successfully launched her business own business, MHixel Prints, an online store selling custom-made printed clothing.

"Working alongside Employability Durham has not just helped boost my confidence, it has also helped me move forward as a new business. The team supported me in getting the vital equipment I needed to get started," Debbie said.

"Going self-employed is such a daunting experience, but working with the team has been such a pleasant and easy experience and their support has helped me get to where I am today."

Self-employment will allow Debbie to work around her childcare needs. She's also written into her financial planning that the business will donate some profits to charities close to her heart.

The team offers a range of support, including one to one support by phone, video calls and face to face meetings. Being able to access the service remotely can also make attending appointments easier when juggling a busy life.

# **Abbey Leisure Centre**

Abbey Leisure Centre has now fully reopened after a major refurbishment programme. The **new-look gym and fitness studios** feature the latest **Technogym equipment**, while the new **Move Hub** is our first facility to feature power assisted equipment designed to help users get moving. # **Peterlee Leisure Centre**

# **Spennymoor Library and Leisure Centre**

Phase one of the works programme at Spennymoor Library and Leisure Centre is now complete. A **new reception area** has been created and the **library** has moved into the building. The second phase of the works is due to begin in the autumn and will include the installation of **interactive features in the pool** and the creation of a **soft play and café area**.

# Woodhouse Close Leisure Complex

A planning application has been submitted to create a new centre in Bishop Auckland that will **bring together leisure**, **library** and **children's services** on a single site alongside a **wellbeing and community hub**. The new building will include **two new swimming pools** and a **modern gym** with the latest equipment and technology. It will also feature a **new library**, which will replace the existing Woodhouse Close Library, and a **Move Hub** providing wellbeing services to support the whole community. By bringing together these services in a single, new build site, it is hoped that the new centre will also help support the ongoing regeneration of Bishop Auckland.

# **Transforming Consett**

Plans to enhance Consett and create a vibrant and thriving town centre have moved into their final stage.

Phases two and three of transformation works in Middle Street in Consett are now underway as part of our Town Centre Capital programme.

The works, which began in the summer, include the laying of additional new paving and the installation of new bins and bollards.

We will also be adding new seating and planters to create areas for people to sit and relax, as well as seating around new bespoke lighting columns which will project seasonal patterns onto the paving year-round. By making Middle Street and other centres more attractive to both visitors and businesses, we are not only hoping to transform our towns and villages into exciting and vibrant places, but we're also encouraging increased footfall which supports new and existing retailers and helps to create and safeguard jobs.

In addition, three vacant units have been brought back into use through our Targeted Business Improvement Scheme, and we're hoping to support a further seven over the coming year, creating 24 new jobs and safeguarding a further 26.

### by John Banham, local historian

John Banham, Secretary of the Durham County Local History Society, researched early banking in North East England for his PhD thesis in the 1990s. With the advent of the online British Newspaper Archive, this talk extends that research to cover the reporting of the activities of local banks in the Durham County Advertiser in the early years of the nineteenth century.

At the time the Advertiser pronounced itself "the only newspaper between York and Newcastle" and covered the activities of country banks in County Durham and North Yorkshire, particularly during the banking crash of 1815/16.




