Introduction

Portfolio Holder Statement

As the Cabinet portfolio holder for Economy and Partnerships I am proud to say that the Area Action Partnerships fall within my remit.

AAPs have been supporting work in local communities for 15 years now. Funding has helped to sustain and develop numerous local organisations right across County Durham. Nearly £30m has been allocated through Area Budget grants since AAPs were created back in 2009 supporting nearly 3000 different applications.

The 14 AAPs cover the whole of the county, each with effective boards of 21 people which are made up of partners, public, councillors and agencies. The Boards work on their specific priorities that reflect the needs of the county's varied localities. Over the last year they have again allocated nearly £2M which has supported over 190 local projects.

Fellow County Councillors and I are very grateful for the support we get from the AAPs in allocating our Neighbourhood Budget. This is funding every councillor gets to support good causes and projects in the areas we represent. Since 2009 over £37m has been allocated through nearly 8000 different applications. You can imagine the difference funding via the AAPs and Councillors has made to our towns, villages and city. This year councillors have supported well over 600 projects with over £2.4M of funding.

At a time when communities and families are having to deal with ongoing financial pressures AAPs have been able to help those organisations who are helping others. The strength of the voluntary and community sector in County Durham never fails to amaze me.

I do want to take this opportunity to thank everyone who gives up their time and volunteers with local organisations. Be that with sports clubs, management committees at community centres, environmental schemes

or those people who volunteer on AAP Boards. County Durham would be a poorer place without you. However volunteering has to be supported and it's a key area that AAPs help with in terms of supporting groups with volunteer management, training and support.

There is no doubt that community organisations are struggling through the ongoing cost of living crisis so if you have ever thought about volunteering now could be the time. Local organisations give so much to their communities and they do need our help.

Since 2009 AAPs have been a feature of our communities but change is ahead. Last year the council concluded a review of its community engagement activities which included the AAPs. The outcomes of this review are now being implemented and this is going to lead to enhancements in 2025 with AAPs being replaced by new 'Local Networks'. The Local Networks will continue to bring local people, councillors and organisations together building on the legacy of the AAPs with the aim of broadening the reach within communities and developing Local Network Plans setting out the longer-term aspirations for our many towns and villages. Over the coming months we will keep people updated as we develop Local Network structures.

Prior to the launch of Local Networks in 2025, AAPs will continue to deliver over the next year which will only be possible with the hard work of all involved. So a big thank you from me to fellow councillors, AAP Board members, partner organisations, members of the public and the AAP staff. I look forward to continuing to work with you all over the next 12 months.


Over the last year the key focus has been on 'Community/ Covid Recovery' and nearly £131, 532 has been allocated to local organisations to help them take action on local issues.

Nifty Fifties -

Community Walking Group

Nifty Fifties are a community walking group based in Shildon who meet fortnightly on Wednesdays and enjoy both local walks and walks further afield. The group has been in existence since 2002 and is well supported with members who attend walks regularly.

Walks take place locally but the group also enjoy trips to places of interest using Shildon Community transport. The group secured Area Budget funding of £5,000 to support bus hire to enable the trips to take place. The group have since enjoyed trips and walks to Herrington Country Park, Seaton Carew to Hartlepool, Whitley Bay and Richmond, to name to few, as well as plenty of local walks in and around Shildon.

Walking offers numerous health and wellbeing benefits and enables people to socialise. Group members have commented:

"I so look forward to our walks"

"The trips take me to new places, that I couldn't otherwise have got to"

"Its great having good company and lots of chat whilst walking"

"Gets me out of the house"

This project aimed to support 26 beneficiaries.



Shildon Alive -

The Fruit, Veg and Eggs Pledge

Shildon Alive is a St John's Church initiative based in Shildon with the aims of supporting local communities.

Shildon Alive was awarded Area Budget of £20,944 to support the Fruit, Veg and Eggs Pledge that was set up to ensure over 1000 individuals received fruit, veg and eggs on a weekly basis, either as part of a meal, a food parcel or a pantry basket.

Shildon Alive have developed a large network, rescuing, and redistributing surplus food and have collaborated with five other local organisations (The Well, Little Chefs Big Little Chefs, Woodhouse Close Church, Journey and Shelve For All). This partnership feeds families and individuals for free or heavily subsided on a weekly basis across the BASH AAP area.

Shildon Alive order fruit, veg and eggs weekly to be delivered to a central distribution point, and then food is divided between the partners, adding extra items which they have rescued from their #feedbelliesnotbins project.

The programme involved coordinating one paid driver and ten volunteers to collect and sort the food as well as liaising with partners to distribute food and support within the AAP area. The project aimed to support 501 beneficiaries.



King James 1 Academy

King James School was supported by Holiday Activities with Healthy Food funding to deliver activities during holiday periods throughout the year.

The programme has an emphasis on Multi Skills and works with a specialist sports provider to deliver a wide range of sporting and broader physical activities to children of both primary and secondary school age.

All activities take place at the school with use made of the extensive range of indoor and outdoor facilities, with participants drawn from both King James itself and schools throughout the AAP area.

Total daily attendances for sessions delivered in 2023-24 were 1,894, with an average of 84% of attendees being in receipt of free school meals.

The Difference We Have Made

Projects supported by Bishop Auckland and Shildon AAP have been making a difference in 2023/24.

Bishop Auckland College - Upskilling, Employability & Discretionary Fund

Bishop Auckland College were funded via Area Budget funding to support residents in finding employment or to progress in their career. This has had a positive impact in building their confidence, self-esteem and had a positive impact in contributing to the local economy. The project enables residents to develop the skills, qualifications, and attributes they will need, if they are to secure employment or improve their employment status. The project supports a vast range of training and to date has supported training including:

The project has supported the development of strong partnership working between the college and the referral organisations and has seen several clients gain employment because of the training provided via the employability project.
