






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

Gala Youth Theatre drama sessions

Gala Youth Theatre sessions are now available to book for dates up to the end of the year.

Open to young people aged four to 18, Gala Youth Theatre offers a wide range of opportunities to improve confidence, develop performance and creative skills, and make new friends whilst learning about the process of theatre-making.

Empire Consett repairs

It's important that our cultural venues are able to serve our communities for many years to come.

To ensure we are able to offer audiences at Empire Consett the best quality shows and performances in a



comfortable and safe venue, it is necessary for important remedial work to be carried out in the theatre's roof areas.

Unfortunately, the nature of the work means that it's not possible for the venue to remain fully open while this work is undertaken. Therefore, Empire Consett will temporarily close in February 2024 for work to take place and will reopen in Autumn 2024.





School sea glass mosaic installed

Three sea glass mosaics created by schoolchildren have been officially unveiled in Seaham.

Pupils from Seaham Trinity and Ropery Walk primary schools worked with local artist Susan Warlock to create the mosaics, which commemorate National Heritage Lottery investment in Seaham, as part of our £1.6m Seaham Townscape Heritage Project. The project has seen the relocation of car parking, the widening and re-paving of footpaths and the transformation of the former rail tracks at South Crescent. Repairs and improvements have also been made to shop fronts.

The mosaics, which incorporate found and donated sea glass from the Seaham coast alongside traditional glass tiles, have been installed at the bottom of Church Street.

Schools learn road safety tricks



Hundreds of

County Durham schoolchildren enjoyed a series of magic shows packed with road safety messages.

With the help of spellbinding tricks, plenty of jokes and some catchy songs, reception and key stage one pupils from 10 primary schools were given an important introduction to road safety. Topics covered include "stop, look and listen", finding safe places to cross, and how to use pedestrian crossings.

We completed improvements to the path between Old Pit Lane in Newton Hall, and Rivergreen at Aykley Heads, by widening and resurfacing it to make it accessible for walking and wheeling. Children from the nearby Busy Bees Nursery were invited as special guests to an official opening event, after showing a keen interest in the project.

DurhamLearn rated "good"

Our adult learning service has once again been rated as "good" by Ofsted.

The service provides education and training across the county with courses ranging from English and maths to digital skills and first aid.

Following a four-day inspection by a six-strong Ofsted team, it was rated "good" in all areas.

The inspectors reported that staff "develop learners' confidence and character very well" and "treat learners with respect and care". Learners and apprentices "quickly learn the skills that they need to gain and maintain employment", they added. They also praised the service for developing skills programmes "that meet local employer needs" and "address social isolation in communities".

Preparing for emergencies

Stay safe

Emergency situations such as severe weather, flooding and power cuts can have a big impact on you and your property, and can happen at any time.

Here are some steps to make sure you are as prepared as possible to deal with a serious incident.

Plan ahead

Write down key information about you and your family such as contact numbers, insurance numbers and medication lists. Share this with family and friends and store in an accessible place.

Download apps and bookmark websites you think may be useful in the case of an emergency so that they are easy to find.



Plan and prepare

Extra help for vulnerable people

All utility companies should hold a priority services register. This is a list of people who are considered vulnerable and would struggle without gas or electricity supply, even for a few hours, and therefore will receive additional help in an emergency situation. If you meet the criteria, you can sign up at:

- First aid kit

Warm and well this winter

It's important to look after yourself and others during cold weather. Here are some seasonal health tips to help you stay well and build activity into your winter days.



Staying warm, well and well hydrated

These simple tips can help keep us all warm and well this winter.

- ★ Stay active, remember to dress for the weather and wear shoes with good grip outside
- ★ Drink at least six to eight mugs of liquid a day, especially warm drinks during cold weather
- ★ Keep your home between 18 and 21°C during the day and at least 18°C at night

Check in on neighbours

This is so important, especially during the winter. If you are concerned about someone, call Social Care Direct on **03000 26 79 79**.



Watch out for signs of hypothermia, such as shivering, cold and pale skin, slurred speech, fast breathing, tiredness and confusion. If you think someone is suffering from hypothermia, call **999** immediately.

Be Wise, Immunise

One of the best ways to protect yourself and those around you from winter illness this year is to get your flu and Covid-19 vaccinations – it is safe to get them together.



You may be able get them through the NHS if you:

- ✓ are aged 65 or over (including those who will be 65 by 31 March 2024)
- have certain health conditions or a learning disability
- ✓ are pregnant
- ✓ live with someone who has a weakened immune system
- are a carer
- ✓ are a frontline health or social care worker.
- ✓ live in a care home

Flu vaccines will be offered to most children aged 2-3 or in school years Reception – Year 11.

In County Durham, your GP will call you with a Covid-19 vaccination appointment, please don't call them. You can also book a pharmacy appointment online / calling 119.

Get outside

Enjoy a breath of fresh air with our Move outdoor activity programme, which features autumnal walks, cycle rides and running groups. Activities are led by our experienced leaders who will guide you through your activity whilst you enjoy the scenery and seasonal colour changes. Preparing our roads for winter

As the cold weather sets in, our highways team is already working to ensure our roads are ready for you to travel safely. Our preparation for the winter months starts early, with checks to make sure our vehicles are serviced and winter ready.



Looking ahead

Our team use specialist forecasting systems, supplemented by data from our weather stations to make decisions on when to grit our priority road network.

Follow our Facebook and Twitter accounts for regular updates on road conditions and gritting routes. Remember to check the weather before setting off, particularly if you are heading on a long journey. Met Office weather warnings are available at www.durham.gov.uk/weatherwarnings



Driving in snow and ice

Snow and ice can make driving dangerous. The safest option is to stay at home in these conditions, but if you need to travel, follow our top tips to keep safe on the roads this winter.



- ✓ Ensure your vehicle is topped up with a low temperature screen wash and check your lights, indicators and tyres before driving.
- Let someone know your intended route and expected time of arrival.
- ✓ Make sure your mobile phone is fully charged.
- Allow at least 10 seconds stopping time between you and the vehicle in front.
- ✓ Accelerate, steer and brake more gently.
- Use dipped headlights.
- ✓ Take a hot drink, water and food with you.
- ✓ Make sure you have a snow shovel, tow bar or other equipment to help if your car gets stuck.
- ✗ Don't try to overtake vehicles which are clearing or gritting the road.

Think about your speed

During Road Safety Week, from **19 to 25 November**, we are encouraging drivers to think about their speed.

Five people die on UK roads every day

Excess speed is a contributory factor in 1 in 3 fatal road crashes

An average speed reduction of 1mph reduces crash frequency by 5 per cent

Speed can be the difference between life and death. The speed a vehicle is travelling dictates whether or not a driver will be able to stop in time to avoid a crash and, if they can't stop, the force of the impact when they crash.

Breaking the speed limit (or travelling too fast for conditions) is recorded by police at crash scenes as a contributory factor in around a third of all fatal crashes and a quarter of crashes that result in serious injury.

Speeding traffic can also make our communities noisier and more polluted, discouraging walking and cycling.



Stop means stop!

School Crossing Patrols - affectionately and locally known as 'lollipop' men and women - ensure the safety of children, young people and adults by providing a safer environment to cross the road.

Below are four nationally recognised signals you might see from our lollipop legends, but do you know what they mean? Figure C is the most misunderstood.

Here's what each one means:



If you see the school crossing patrol standing on the pavement holding out the sign, then you must be prepared to stop your vehicle (provided it is safe to do so) – even if the patrol is on the opposite side of the road.

The simplest way of putting it is that **STOP means STOP**.

Please help keep our schoolchildren and our school crossing patrols safe.

By the way, we're currently recruiting school crossing patrol staff at locations across the county. We also need a number of casual staff.

Recycle right this Christmas

Over the festive period, 30 per cent more glass bottles and jars, food and drinks cans, paper and cardboard will be thrown away.

Here are our top Christmas recycling tips to help you reduce your impact on the environment as well as your waste. Find out what to do with old batteries, Christmas trees and wrapping paper.

Baubles

Glass baubles are not recyclable. Broken glass baubles should be disposed of by wrapping and putting in with general waste.

Plastic baubles are usually made from types of plastic not widely collected yet in the UK and are likely to be covered with glitter which would impact on the recycling process, so should also go in general waste.

Tinsel

Tinsel cannot be recycled. If your tinsel has finally lost its sparkle and needs to be thrown away, please dispose of it in the waste bin.

Wreaths

Natural materials on wreaths, such as ivy, fir cones, mistletoe and holly, can be composted as long as they are not covered with excessive glitter. Simply remove the greenery from the base and add to your garden or green


waste collection or drop off at your local Household Waste Recycling Centre. Artificial decorations such as ribbons and plastic flowers will need to be removed as these cannot be recycled.



Presents

Plain Christmas wrapping paper, without glitter or sparkles, can be placed in your recycling bin but remember to take off any tags and tape. Remember the scrunch test! If it scrunches, it can be recycled. Foil wrapping paper cannot be recycled.

Batteries



you can take them to one of our small electrical recycling points and dispose of them there.



Career opportunities

Lisa Bestford wanted to improve her maths skills so that she could change to a less physically demanding job for health reasons.

Lisa's dyscalculia affects her ability to understand number sequences and basic functions. Bad learning experiences in the past had given Lisa a fear of maths, which Multiply helped her overcome. Her tutor also ensured her learning environment allowed her to walk around or stand when she needed to manage pain.

The 36-year-old from Bishop Auckland is now completing higher level courses so that she can apply for administrative jobs.

"I thought Multiply was very simple to understand because it was everyday situations," Lisa said. "If I did not do Multiply, I would have avoided doing any more maths courses."


Learning new techniques

Charlie Crossley joined Multiply to develop her confidence and life skills before moving away from home for the first time.

The 24-year-old from Edmondsley wanted to improve her maths skills because she thought home-schooling had left her with gaps in her knowledge.

Charlie's tutor helped her master key skills such as fractions and percentages and taught her new, easier methods to replace the more difficult and time-consuming ones she had been using.

"Multiply has aided me in confidence with handling money, which is a huge part of moving to London and preparing for a degree." said Charlie. "The course was extremely helpful towards my personal trainer course. For the first time, I did not feel like the odd one out for lacking knowledge in maths."



Confidence boost

Emma Tempest, from Peterlee, worked with a tutor to improve her maths skills and can now shop with confidence.

The 42-year-old struggled with maths due to dyslexia, dyscalculia, learning difficulties and memory issues. However, she found that the short, focussed activities and frequent breaks offered by Multiply prevented her from feeling overwhelmed, and is now enjoying using her new skills to calculate the correct change in shops.

"I wanted to be able to pay my bills and read my letters by myself and this has helped me do that," she said. "I was embarrassed before about my maths skills but am now a lot more confident."







Working together to support foster carers

We recently celebrated the launch of Foster with North East, a partnership which brings together the knowledge and expertise of 12 councils, including ours, to better support foster carers in the region.

Former teacher Julia and her husband Mark, a retired police officer, have been foster carers with us for 11 years and now receive support from Foster with North East. They have two grown-up children, two grandchildren and are currently caring for three babies.

The couple made the choice to foster when their daughter left for university. "It really hit us, and I had a sudden feeling of 'Is that it?'." said Julia. We felt that we had so much more love and care to give. We talked it through with our children and they encouraged us."

Julia says people are often curious to find out how she manages to say goodbye when children return to their birth family or move on with adoptive parents. "I consider us as being just a little part of a child's journey and something that we are privileged to be part of. Ultimately you just want what's best for the child and to see them happy."

But what makes a good foster carer?

"Fostering is more than just caring for a child, you must be prepared to attend meetings and keep records up to date, and always be their advocate and voice," Julia added.

"As with all caring it's not always easy but there is lots of support, from social groups through to official training and working closely with social workers.

"For us, fostering isn't a job, it has brought us an immense amount of pleasure. There's nothing better than waking up and seeing a baby smiling and giggling at you. The children have brought us more joy than we ever imagined possible, and we wish we had done it sooner."

There are often misconceptions about who can foster, but the reality is that foster carers are needed from diverse backgrounds and with different circumstances. If you are over 21, have a spare bedroom for older children and have the right to live and work in the UK, then you could be a foster carer.





Spotlight on Bishop Auckland

We're helping to build a better Bishop Auckland for everyone to enjoy.

With more than £192 million being invested in the town to improve transport connections, create brand new commercial and leisure facilities and develop significant cultural attractions as well as 3,750 new jobs, there is lots to be excited about.



Considerable investment of £19.8 million has been secured through the **Future High Street Fund**. This money is being used to support a number of projects, ranging from a **new bus station** to **public space improvements**. The town was also one of only 101 areas nationally to be selected to apply for **Stronger Town Funding** and successfully secured £33.2 million for an agreed set of projects.

In **Newgate Street**, we are using some of this money to bring empty properties back in to use. We're also preparing to welcome **STACK** to the high street, with work now underway on site. Once finished, it will house local independent food traders and bars, as well as providing space for a wide variety of live entertainment.

As well as boosting the local economy, the development should bring more visitors to the town.

Further down the street, plans have been approved for the regeneration of **Kingsway Quarter**. The proposals will see 3,000m² of derelict land and disused

buildings transformed into a new vibrant public square and car park.

Surrounded by buildings of historical significance, it will revitalise and repurpose the area as a place for people to visit, live, work, dine and shop.

Reinventing the town centre

Businesses around the town are already enjoying the benefits of investment from our **Property Reuse Fund**.

The fund is a vital part of the Bishop Auckland Masterplan and our plans to regenerate and bring new life to the town centre, with grants available to bring buildings back into use.

The aim is to encourage a more diverse and modern retail, hospitality and accommodation offer in order to attract more visitors, who stay longer and spend more money in the town.



Moss & Ivy @ The Vines

Joanne and Wayne Parnaby opened the doors to their new venture last year and it has proven to be a hit with shoppers and diners.

They used their grant to redevelop the entire three floors of a vacant building. The ground floor is now a home accessories store, while the upper two floors boast a luxurious coffee lounge bar that pays homage to the heritage of the building.

A total of almost 70 per cent of the cost to complete the work came from the Property Reuse Fund.



Inspiral Cycles

Gary and Fiona Ewing, owners of Inspiral Cycles on Newgate Street, applied to the scheme with hopes of contributing to the accommodation offer for the up-and-coming tourism scene.

They used the money from their grant to redevelop the upstairs of their new bicycle workshop into an eco-friendly, self-contained flat. They wanted to create accommodation which could be rented as a holiday let for those visiting bike trails such as Hamsterley Forest or the new tourist attractions in the town.

Fiona and Gary have also used a Business Improvement Grant to improve their shopfront with new signage and a new coat of paint, helping their business stand out on the high street.



47 Newgate Street

Plans were approved last year to convert all three stories of the old Burton's menswear store and the vacant Post Office building, on the corner of Newgate Street and Victoria Avenue.

The site is undergoing a major revamp, which will see it converted into 10 luxury apartments. The development will include restoration of the historical façade and a new extension to the rear of the property.

Part of the restoration work will be funded by Historic England and the council through the Conservation Area Grant Scheme.

The ground floor will be home to an exciting new venue from Bishop Auckland company Caps Off which will also see the creation of 15 new jobs.









Selective Licensing of privately rented properties

Since April 2022, private landlords have been required to obtain a licence to legally rent their properties in selected areas of the county.

About 42% of the private rented sector is covered and you can check if a property is included at www.durham.gov.uk/selectivelicensing



The licence fee is a maximum of £500, per property, for the length of the five-year scheme.

keeping your home warm this winter



The rising cost of living is affecting many of us, especially during these winter months when you might be worried about being able to affordably heat your home.

It's important you feel able to heat your home, to protect your and your family's health. Here's some tips on keeping costs down while ensuring your home is warm this winter:

- If your radiators have valves, turn them up in the rooms you want to keep warm and down in the rooms you aren't using.
- If you have a combi boiler, turn the flow temperature down.
- Use timers on your central heating.
- If you can, set your thermostat at the lowest comfortable temperature (recommended 18°C to 21°C).
- Take regular meter readings to ensure your bills are accurate.
- An annual heating service will ensure the performance of your heating throughout the year. If you rent your home, your landlord will arrange this.
- Open curtains during the day and close them at night, to let warmth in and keep cold out.
- Wash your clothes on a lower temperature if vou can.
- Move furniture away from radiators or heaters if you can, to help heat travel around your home.
- Remember, it's important to keep your home ventilated, too. Try not to block ventilation such as windows, air blocks or extractor fans.

Get expert advice

Expert organisations can provide further help and advice. Useful contacts:

- The GOV.UK website hosts helpful information on support with energy bills.
- Citizens Advice can advise on help with energy bills.
- Your energy supplier might be able to help if you're disabled or have a long-term health condition.
- If you rent your home with a housing association, check what services and support they offer.

Visit the GOV.UK website to check if you are eligible for support with the cost of living and funding energy, such as:

- You could get £150 off your electricity bill for winter 2023 to 2024 under the Warm Home Discount scheme if you get the Guarantee Credit element of Pension Credit or are on a low income.
- You may be eligible for Cost of Living Payments which are available to households on means-tested benefits.

If you rent your home with a housing association and are worried about rising costs, being able to afford heating your home, or the implications of not being able to do so, speak to your landlord or visit their website to find out what specialised and personalised support they can offer you.

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
