Kelloe Way Railway Path

What is special?

Coal was once shipped from collieries at East and West Hetton to Hartlepool, via the Kelloe Waggonway. The railway also brought in supplies, mainly timber and machinery, to the mine. Along the route, there are a number of information panels and sculptures dedicated to the rich mining history. At the northern end is a plaque erected in memory to ten miners who died in a colliery flood in 1897.

At Kelloe, there is an unusual sculpture reflecting the mine workings, complete with golden nuggets (coal) and davy lamps. In the present day this linear track, lined with mature hedgerow, forms a fantastic wildlife corridor. There are many species of insects, butterflies and song birds present.

The grassland at the side of the path is nationally important as it forms part of the Magnesian Limestone landscape. It contains wildflowers which typically grow on this type of soil including northern marsh orchid, common spotted orchid, knapweed and bird's foot trefoil.

To the south of the path is Raisby Hill Grassland, an area of Magnesian Limestone Grassland which is managed by Durham Wildlife Trust.

Between June and September keep your eyes peeled for Viper's bugloss, whose bright blue flowers are very attractive to bees and butterflies. Its name comes from the fact that its fruit looks like a viper and herbal recipes say it can cure a bite from a viper. Other creatures to look out for include pipistrelle bats, song thrush, linnet and dingy skipper butterflies and roe deer.



Kelloe Way Railway Path Accessibility Statement The path surface is an unsealed hard surface with some sections of compacted earth and is generally flat. It has a small number of gradients which are shown on the map. Erosion has occurred in several places, especially on the slopes slopes. The path width ranges from 2 metres to less than 1 metre in some places, the section next to Kelloe village is the narrowest.
