During my time at Aycliffe, obviously I've been here 7 years, and I've had the opportunity to do many things, so I've achieved 2 separate NVQs, and I've moved from a Residential Worker up to a Senior Residential Worker...

The challenges in my role, I'm somebody who likes to change the world so sometimes I've got to say you can't do everything, stay within your boundaries, keep professional and take one day at a time...

It can be very challenging when you are faced with such tragic circumstances, for such fragile young people...

When you have children yourself and you see the comfort you can provide for your own children, and you are suddenly faced with young people who have none of that, or who are taken away from their family, young people who have been traumatised, whose childhood has been robbed from them and their experiences have been taken away, forever taken away. That is something which is an enormous challenge.

One of the hardest parts for me of the job is when they are struggling and their levels of aggression and physical aggression increase, it can be really challenging for staff.

With a little bit of perseverance, you can break through, and they always leave better than they came in.

So for a big part of the wellbeing within Aycliffe secure, obviously we do have a listening service but for large, the support of the team is the most vital thing, so obviously we do have to deal with a lot of complex and challenging situations...

But the team around us, we have this unique ability and almost like a bond really and we work within that to kind of support each other through the very difficult times...

You're gaining their trust, and you see these positive changes within young people, and it makes a massive difference.
